St. Bridget laid strong foundations for the Church in Ireland. Her feast day is February 1st, the first day of the Celtic Spring.

"For a long time, Jesus and little Therese had gazed at each other and they understood each other. On that day it was no longer a matter of gazing: it was a union. ... Heaven dwelt in my soul."

Such was the way St. Therese of Lisieux spoke of her first Holy Communion in her spiritual autobiography, The Story of a Soul. I can't exactly say I had a similar mystical experience on the day I made my first Holy Communion. In fact, I really can't remember that day at all.

That's why I look forward to celebrating this moment each year with our second graders.

Having read the writings of the saints, who speak so beautifully about the graces we receive in each Holy Communion we receive; after reflecting on what the Scriptures say about the Eucharist, I like to think I have a deeper love and appreciation for the most Blessed Sacrament, an appreciation that perhaps was not there when I was younger. Helping our children prepare for their first Holy Communion helps keep that sense of wonder alive for me.

In receiving the Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity of Jesus Christ, we truly do receive the Bread that comes down from Heaven. Heaven dwells in us, as Therese so beautifully stated.

The Eucharist deepens our relationship with Christ, who becomes one with us, but also with the Trinity as a whole. Where one Person is present, all Persons are present. St. John Damascene writes that we call it "Communion" because yes, we are united with Christ; but because Christ unites all of the members of his mystical body, both on earth and in heaven, it is also communion with all those who have gone before us.

I personally want to thank the catechists (Mrs. Beth Shoemaker assisted by Jacob Lewis & Kathryn Shoemaker and Ms. Jessica Alfaro) who have worked so hard to prepare our children. The most important teachers our children have, however, are mom and dad. I pray that this will be a grace filled time for you, as well. I invite you to reflect as well on the great graces that come from the moment of Holy Communion, and in doing so, I pray that you will instill a desire in your child for all that Our Lord desires to give them.

Saint of the Week

Ivo was born into a noble family about 1040. He first studied in Paris, and then at the Abbey of Bee in Normandy, at the same time as St. Anselm. In 1080 he became, at the desire of his bishop, prior of the canons of St-Ouentin at Beauvais. He was then one of the best teachers in France. He was appointed bishop in 1090, his predecessor, Geoffroy, having been deposed for simony. His episcopal government, at first opposed by the tenants of Geoffroy, ranged over a period of twenty-five years. Ivo appears as a man always faithful to his duties, high-minded, full of zeal and piety, sound in his judgments, a keen jurist, straight-forward, mindful of others' rights, devoted to the papacy and to his country, at the same time openly disapproving of what he considered wrong. As bishop he strongly opposed Philip the First, who wished to desert Bertha, his legitimate wife, and marry Bertrade of Anjou (1092); his opposition gained him a prison cell. Though he died too early to witness the final triumph of his ideas with the Concordat of Worms (1122), his endeavors and his doctrines may be said to have paved the way for an agreement satisfactory to both sides. Ivo died in 1116. His feast day is May 20.
