In this weekend's Gospel reading, Our Lord delivers a parable about humility.

Our words and our works express something about what is inside each one of us. They reveal something about the person we truly are. Thus, we can say that living a Christian life doesn't begin with what we do, but who we are. The collected wisdom of saints seems to point in one direction when it comes to this: the virtue of humility is one of the most important virtues we can strive to cultivate.

Humility is not put into practice by constantly putting ourselves down

or degrading ourselves. Today that's self-flagellation. Humility involves recognizing the truth about who we are. We recognize our weaknesses, faults, and sins, but we also recognize the gifts and talents we possess. In the first case, it takes humility to accept the fact that we are not perfect. It may hurt us to acknowledge and accept that we have done something wrong, but that humility is what opens us up to receiving mercy from God and from others and can lead to healing. In the latter case, it is okay to acknowledge that we have certain gifts and talents or a certain aptitude for a particular job. Humility is what moves us to thank God for giving us these gifts and asking, for as long as we may have them, the grace to use them well.

When we cultivate this humility in ourselves, it flows outward. If I have the humility to accept my faults and failings – if I can learn to be patient with myself – can I not learn how to be patient with others in their faults and failings? If I know that many a time I have needed to be forgiven, can I not bring myself to forgive others? If I can learn to laugh at myself, do I not take away the power of the world to bring me down? Peace of soul is one of the great fruits of the virtue of humility.

Like I said, some of the greatest saints have spoken about the importance of this virtue, and I close with some nuggets worthy of contemplation and consideration:

"It was pride that changed angels into devils; it is humility that makes man angels." "Do you wish to be great? Then begin by being. Do you desire to construct a vast and lofty fabric? Think first about the virtue of humility. The higher your structure is to be, the deeper must be the foundation."

"Humility is the foundation of all the other virtues, hence in the soul in which this virtue does not exist there cannot be any other virtue except in mere appearance." -- St. Augustine

"The most powerful weapon to conquer the devil is humility. For, as he does not know at all how to employ it, neither does he know how to defend himself from it." -- St. Vincent de Paul

"It is no great thing to be humbled when you are brought low, but to be humbled when you are praised is a great and rare attainment." -- St. Bernard

"There is more virtue in a little study of humility and in a single act of it then in all the knowledge in the world." -- St. Theresa of Avila

"He who wants to learn true humility should reflect upon the Passion of Jesus." -- St. Faustina.

Saint of the Week

St. Teresa of Calcutta:

Agnes Gonxha Bojaxhiu was born in Skopje, Macedonia on August 26, 1910. In 1928, at age 18, Agnes joined the missionary order of the Sisters of Loreto in Dublin, Ireland. There she was given the name Sister Mary Teresa. As a young Sister in 1929 she traveled to Calcutta (today known as Kolkata), India, to teach at a school for girls. She continued to teach at various schools in India for 20 years. During that time, she was deeply moved by the number of sick and dying people on the streets. On September 10, 1946, while traveling by train to Darjeeling, Sister Mary Teresa experienced a "call within a call." She felt called to be God's love in action: to serve the sick and dying, the hungry and homeless. She received permission to leave the Loreto convent. Then she sought medical training and became determined to serve the poorest of the poor. Eventually, she was joined by other women. Some of these women were her former students, and they helped her serve the poor. In 1950 she established an order of religious women called the Missionaries of Charity. Over time the Missionaries of Charity have built centers throughout the world. In 1979 Mother Teresa, as she was known by then, received the Nobel Peace Prize. She captivated the world as few other people have. Her simple message was: "We are put on earth to do something beautiful for God." Mother Teresa's Feast Day is September 5th.
