Pastor's Words

Dear St. Bridget Parishioners,

Holy Week is underway. As I mentioned in my last post, we will be live-streaming the liturgies of Holy Week on Youtube. The link is on the parish website. None of this would be possible if not for the efforts of the following people: Connor Kleb (a member of Holy Trinity Parish in Gainesville and long-time friend), Peter and Patrick Russman, Michael Murrow, and Anthony Coviello. I am totally technologically illiterate and could never have pulled this off. A thousand thanks to all of you.

As we recall the events of Our Lord's Passion, several things come to mind.

I've heard several people point out that, on the first Easter, the apostles were gathered in the Upper Room with doors locked. They were afraid of what was going to happen to them now that their Master was gone. Sounds familiar doesn't it? This Easter, we will be staying at home. We will be anxious about what may come next.

On that first Easter Sunday, the Risen Lord appeared to the Apostles and said, "Peace be with you." He appeared to them despite the locked doors of the Upper Room. Today, we may not be able to be in a church to celebrate together, but that does not stop the Risen Lord from coming into our homes and saying, once again, "Peace be with you." To participate in the Mass, even when watching on television or on a computer, is to hear the Good News proclaimed once again: He is risen!!! To hear the word proclaimed is to be reminded once more of the reality: Christ has been raised from the dead. He has passed from death to life and, in doing so, has given us the hope of everlasting life: "I am the resurrection and the life; he who believes In me, though he die, yet shall he live, and whoever lives and believes in me shall never die" (Jn 11:25-26).

This new Passover was foreshadowed by the first Passover, celebrated centuries before the time of Christ and recalled in a special way on Holy Thursday. On that night, the Israelites enslaved in Egypt were huddled in their homes, forbidden from going outdoors, as the angel of death passed over the Land of Egypt. It was the blood of a lamb that brought them life and salvation.

St. John Chrysostom, 7th century bishop of Constantinople, speaks about the power of that blood and how it foreshadows the power of Christ's blood: "In those days, when the destroying angel saw the blood on the doors he did not dare to enter, so how much less will the devil approach now when he sees, not that figurative blood on the doors, but the true blood on the lips of believers, the doors of the temple of Christ."

On another occasion, the great saint reminded his people that in the Eucharist they do see, touch, and receive the Risen Lord. He said that those Israelites celebrated the first Passover with loins girt and sandals on their feet because they were preparing to go to the Promised Land. We are meant to prepare ourselves for heaven.

There are two things we can reflect on as we recall these events:

First:

Both the old and new Passovers remind us of how God protects His people. The blood of the lamb literally brought salvation and freedom to the Israelites. The next day, they would leave Egypt, no longer slaves. The blood of Christ, the Lamb of God brings us salvation and freedom from sin. We may not always like to think about the reality of the Devil or of Hell, but that would be the sad lot of our souls if we did not have Christ, who died to obtain for us the forgiveness of sins. We use the words salvation and redemption all the time, but what do those words mean? It means that God loves us and saved us from something terrible, something we would not have without Him. As St. Paul says: If God is for us, who can be against us?

Second:

Throughout this season of Lent, the Church has been emphasizing the importance of making a spiritual communion. That is, we pour out in prayer our deepest longing and desire to receive Our Lord in the Blessed Sacrament even when we are not physically capable of doing so. We express our deepest love for the Lord, even when we cannot be there to receive him. I remind everyone that such a desire is itself a source of grace for us. We should never feel as if watching a Mass on television or computer is no avail to us. Participating the liturgies which make present to us once again the saving Passion of the Lord enables us to share in the fruits of his redemptive work.

I suppose I could summarize this as follows: The Grinch though he could prevent Christmas from com-

Saint of the Week

St. Hunna

Not much is known about Saint Hunna. In fact, some say that her name is Huva. She was born in the seventh century in Alsace, France. As the daughter of a duke, Hunna was an aristocratic woman by birth and breeding. She married a nobleman, Huno, of Hunnaweyer, a small village in the Diocese of Strasbourg. It can be assumed that they were not poor. She was known to be so caring of the poor around her that she even lent a hand in doing the washing for her neighbors in need. Because of this she was known as "the holy washerwoman". Hunna also donated properties to monasteries and financed the construction of churches. Hunna and Huno had a son who was baptized by the holy bishop of Nevers, St. Deodatus, and was given his name in Baptism. This son later entered a monastery founded by the same St. Deodatus at Ebersheim. Hunna died in 679. Her Feast Day is April 15th.
