Divine Mercy Sunday

Sometimes it seems that one of the great struggles in the spiritual life is letting go of past sins. We go to confession, but we do not seem to be able to forget them, especially if they are serious. Every time we think about them, we begin feeling guilty again, we lose our peace of soul. For some, this may lead to feeling a need to confess the same sin over and over.

Think about the woman caught in the act of adultery (Jn 8;1-11). When Jesus says to her he does not condemn her, we know she has been forgiven. She knew she was being shown an incredible act of mercy. Can we imagine her spending the rest of her days doubting whether she had been forgiven? Can we imagine her spending day after day torturing herself with questions about her worthiness for

such a gift? Instead, can we not imagine rejoicing in that gift? We can almost hear her saying, "Yes, I sinned. But that man forgave me. God forgave me. I have been given new life by that man. By God's grace, I have been made new."

We should be able to say the same after each confession. Memories of past sins linger beyond the moment when the words of absolution are spoken, but we need to remember who it is who really absolved us of our sin: Jesus Christ. If Jesus could look at that woman and say, "I do not condemn you," and send her on her way to lead a new life without looking back, why should we doubt that he says that to us each time we go to confession? It is Christ who is speaking to us through the priest. The words of absolution, which cast our sins behind us, are powerful words because it is Christ who absolves.

We might not forget things we have done, we may feel terrible about them, but if they have been confessed, then God looks at those sins as being behind us. He desires to forget them. Why should we let them trouble us? We should be able to say, too, that God's mercy has made of us a new creation. There may be sins that we seem to struggle with over and over, but even that should never prevent us from trusting the mercy of God.

Pope St. John Paul II declared that the Sunday after Easter should be called Divine Mercy Sunday. In the 1930s, Our Lord spoke to a Polish nun named St. Faustina Kowalska. He asked her to promote devotion to Divine Mercy. To help spread this devotion, he asked for an image to be struck, a chaplet to be prayed, and a Church feast day to celebrate this most beautiful and powerful attribute of God. John Paul II worked hard to bring St. Faustina's message to the world.

Given that we so often struggle with our histories of sin, we can begin to see why this feast day is so important. In her diary, Saint Faustina records the following words, spoken to her by Jesus:

299 - "The two rays (white and red rays depicted on the Divine Mercy image) denote Blood and Water. The pale ray stands for the water which makes souls righteous. The red ray stands for the Blood which is the life of souls...

The two rays issued forth from the very depths of My tender mercy when my agonized Heart was opened by a lance on the cross.

Those rays shield souls from the wrath of my Father. Happy is the one who will dwell in their shelter, for the just hand of God shall not lay hold of him, I desire that the first Sunday after Easter be the Feast of Mercy.

300 -- On this day ... tell the whole world of my great mercy; that whoever approaches the Fount of Life on this day will be granted complete remission of sins and punishment. Mankind will not have peace until it turns with trust to My mercy.

301 -- Oh, how much I am hurt by a soul's distrust! Such a soul professes that I am Holy and Just but does not believe that I am Mercy and does not trust in my goodness. ... My heart rejoices in this title of Mercy.

Proclaim that mercy is the greatest attribute of God. All the works of My hands are crowned with mercy.

Note the moment when Jesus says he is hurt by our distrust of His mercy. If we are allowing ourselves to be tormented by memories of past sins, if we are allowing them to make us question our

worthiness of God's love, perhaps we need to ask ourselves: Do I really trust in his mercy? Do I see God as continually holding my past sins against me and that He will never forget them?

Nothing would seem to be farther from what God has revealed to us through the Scriptures (Psalm 103) and through His Son. That's why we need the feast of Divine Mercy

Saint of the Week St. Franca Visalta:

Franca was born in 1170 in Piacenza, Italy. She was placed in the Benedictine convent of Saint Syrus at Piacenza, Italy in 1177 at age seven and she joined the Order at age 14. Franca became abbess while still young but was removed from the office due to the severe austerities she imposed, and she became isolated from most of her sisters. However, one of the sisters, Carentia, agreed with her discipline. When Carentia entered the Cistercian noviate at Rapallo, Italy, Franca persuaded her parents to build a Cistercian house at Montelana, Italy which they both then entered. Franca became abbess of the community, which later moved to Pittoli, Italy. Franca always maintained the strict austerities she imposed on herself, even in the face of failing health, and spent most nights in chapel, praying for hours. Her Feast Day is April 26th.
