"We pronounce, declare and define it to be a divinely revealed dogma: that the Immaculate Mother of God, the ever-Virgin Mary, having completed the course of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul to heavenly glory."

This is the dogma of The Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary as defined by the Pope and the teaching authority of the Church on November 1, 1950. A dogma is doctrine taught by the Church to be believed by all the faithful as part of divine revelation. Dogmas are revealed either in Scripture or tradition, and their acceptance by the faithful must be proposed as necessary for salvation.

The Church has four Marian dogmas; that is dogmas specifically stating Mary's personal relationship with God and her role in human salvation. The four Marian dogmas are:

> Mary, Mother of God Mary, Ever-Virgin Mary, Immaculately Conceived Mary, Assumed into Heaven


Three of the four dogmas are celebrated as Holy Days throughout the liturgical year, January 1, *Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God*, August 15, *The Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary* and December 8, *The Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary*. The dogma of Mary's Perpetual Virginity, not being a single event, does not have a specific day with which it is associated.

Mary was the first, and only perfect, disciple of Christ, and she is our Mother. She will always lead us to her son, Our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Let us all celebrate her Assumption and beg her prayers for us, our parish, our country, and the world.

Saint of the Week Saint Jane Frances de Chantal

Jane was born January 28, 1572 in Dijon, France to the head of Parliament and his wife. Jane's mother died when she was 18 months old and her father raised and educated her. At 21, she married Baron de Chantal, by whom she had six children, three of whom died in infancy. At her castle, she restored the custom of daily Mass and was seriously engaged in various charitable works. Her happiness was shattered when her husband, Christophe, was killed in a hunting accident. She forgave the man who shot her husband so completely that she even became godmother to his child. These troubles opened her heart to her longing for God, and she sought God in prayer and a deepening spiritual life. Her commitment to God impressed Saint Francis de Sales, the bishop who became her director and best friend. Their friendship started before they met, for they saw each other in dreams, and continued writing letters to each other throughout their lives. With Francis' support, Jane founded the Visitation order for women who were rejected by other orders because of poor health or age. They were primarily intended to exemplify the virtues of Mary at the Visitation—hence their name the Visitation nuns-humility and meekness. She led the Sisters of the Visitation of Holy Mary for the last 24 years of her life. Her Feast Day is August 12.
