Indulgence for the Holy Souls in Purgatory. From November 1 through November 8, a plenary indulgence, applicable only to the Holy Souls, is granted to those who visit a cemetery and pray, even if only mentally, for the faithfully departed.

Only ONE plenary indulgence can be gained per day.

Here is what you need to do to gain an indulgence:

In addition to visiting a cemetery, you must be in a state of grace (not to have any unconfessed mortal sins on your soul), and these conditions must be met:

- You must receive the Sacrament of Confession within 20 days before or after the indulgence is to be gained.
- You must receive Holy Communion on that day on which the indulgence is to be gained.
- You must recite prayers for the intentions of the Holy Father (the prayers you choose to pray are up to you, but an "Our Father" and a "Hail Mary" are suggested).
- Finally you must not have any attachment to sin, even venial sin.

Dear brothers and sisters, good morning!

This Sunday's liturgy presents to us a brief but very important Gospel passage (cf. *Mt* 22:34-40). The evangelist Matthew recounts that the Pharisees came together to put Jesus to the test. One of them, a Doctor of the Law, asked Him this question: "Teacher, which is the great commandment in the Law?" (v. 36). It is an insidious question, as the Law of Moses mentions more than six hundred precepts. How can one distinguish, among all these, the greatest commandment? However, Jesus does not hesitate, and answers: "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind." And He adds: "You shall love your neighbor as yourself" (v. 37, 39).

Jesus' answer is not to be taken for granted because, among the many precepts of the Jewish Law, the most important were the Ten Commandments, communicated directly by God to Moses, as conditions of the pact of the Covenant with the people. However, Jesus wants it to be understood that without love for God and for one's neighbor, there is no true fidelity to this Covenant with the Lord. You can do many good things, fulfil many precepts, many good things, but if you don't have love, it is worthless.

This is confirmed by another text of the book of Exodus, the "code of the Covenant", where it states that one cannot be in the Covenant with the Lord and mistreat those who enjoy His protection. And who are those who enjoy His protection? The Bible says they are the widow, the orphan, the stranger and the migrant; namely, those who are most alone and vulnerable (cf. Ex 22: 20-21). In responding to those Pharisees who had questioned Him, Jesus tries to help them put their religiosity in order, to re-establish what really counts and what is less important. Jesus says: "On these two commandments depend all the Law and the Prophets" (Mt 22: 40). They are the most important and the others depend on these two. And Jesus in fact lived His life precisely in this way: preaching and doing what truly counts and is essential, namely, love. Love gives impetus and fruitfulness to life and to the journey of faith: without love, both life and faith remain sterile.

What Jesus proposes in this page of the Gospel is a marvelous ideal, which corresponds to the most authentic desire of our heart. In fact, we were created to love and to be loved. God, Who is Love, created us to make us participants in His life, to be loved by Him and to love Him and, with Him, to love other people. This is God's "dream" for man. And, to realize it, we need His grace; we need to receive in ourselves the capacity to love, which comes from God Himself. Jesus offers us the Eucharist precisely for this reason. In it we receive Jesus in the greatest expression of His love, when He offered Himself to the Father for our salvation.

May the Holy Virgin help us to receive in our life the "great commandment" of love for God and for our neighbor. Indeed, even if we have known this since we were children, we will never cease to be converted to it and to put it into practice in the different situations in which we find ourselves.

If you would like your beloved deceased remembered in our All Souls Novena, Novena envelopes are available on the small tables behind the last pews. Envelopes with names will be placed in the sanctuary during the Novena of Masses.

# Saint of the Week

## Saint John Houghton

John was born in 1487 in Essex, England. He graduated from Cambridge with degrees in civil and canon law. John was ordained in 1501 and served as a parish priest for four years. He then became a Carthusian monk, doing his novitiate in the London Charterhouse, and making his final vows in 1516. John briefly became the Prior of the Beauvale Carthusian Charterhouse in Northampton, England in 1531, before being named Prior of the London Charterhouse later that year. In 1534 he was the first person to oppose King Henry VIII's Act of Supremacy, and thus was imprisoned. When the oath was modified to include the phrase "in so far as the law of God permits", John felt he could be loyal to Church and Crown; he and several of his monks signed the oath, though with misgivings. Father Houghton was released, and a few days later, troops arrived at the Charterhouse and forced the remaining monks to sign the modified oath. On February 1, 1535, Parliament required that the original, unmodified oath be signed by all. Following three days of prayer, John contacted Thomas Cromwell to seek an exemption for himself and his monks. He was immediately arrested and thrown in the Tower of London. True to his Carthusian vow of silence. John would not defend himself in court, but refused to cooperate or sign anything. The jury could find no malice to the king, but when threatened with prosecution themselves, they found John and his co-defendants guilty of treason. He became the first person martyred under the Tudor persecutions. His Feast Day is October 25.
